

Prepositions

A **prepositional phrase** is a group of words that contains a preposition, its object, and its modifiers. It usually modifies a noun or a verb. It is called an adjective phrase when it modifies a noun, and it is known as an adverb phrase when it adds details to a verb.

Example: The ride in the park was amazing.
