

The New York City Subway

Today, it is all owned by the City of New York.

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The subway runs through Manhattan, the Bronx, Brooklyn, and Queens. On weekdays, over five million people ride the subway each day. The highest number in history was December 23, 1946. On this day, over eight million people rode in one day!

The New York Subway is open all day and night, and it is open every day of the year. There have been times when some stations had to close, though.

During the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001, many stops in Lower Manhattan were destroyed or badly damaged. During Hurricane Sandy in 2012, the subway tunnels under the East River flooded. They had to be closed until they could be drained.

When emergencies happen, subway workers do all they can to keep the cars running on time. When they do have to close, they work hard to fix things as fast as possible. Work to maintain the subway is a big job, and it takes many workers to do it.
